## 5th Annual Week of Handbells in Bay View

Featured in the concert will be an unusual arrangement of the Welsh melody to which we often sing the hymn *Let All Things Now Living*, which is also the title of the piece. It was arranged by Larry Sue of Mountain View, California. This is Larry's third year participating in the Week of Handbells.

Larry has been a handbell musician since 1987. Although he has played every position across the table, he is best known as a bass ringing specialist and has even written a book about the subject. To underscore the point, haps, he is the Artistic Figurehead or Low Ding Zone, the World's First Bass-Only Handbell Ensemble. When not ringing bass with LDZ or working on bass solos, he directs bell choirs at two churches in the San Francisco Bay Area, rings with Bay Bells of Palo Alto, CA, composes and arranges handbell music, and subsidizes his musical addictions by writing software and tuning pianos.

His ostensible reason for being part of this year's Bay View Week of Handbells, of course, is (as he says) to "sling aluminum," but even more importantly he is here to continue his romance with his fiancee, Carla ciman, one of the best ringers from the United Kingdom (okay, in Larry's opinion). They both are at Bay View for the third time this summer, and this will be her first time at Bay View as a new permanent resident of the United States of America. They'll be getting married in September, and will live in California.

Larry's arrangement for bells is slightly different from the form we sing. That's mainly because it's written in 11 - yes, 11! - beats to the bar. And it moves very fast. You will probably more likely hear it as 3 or 4 to the bar (it varies from one measure to the next), with one beat being shorter than the rest!

The concert will open with Procession of the Nobles by Rimsky-Korsakov, arranged for bells and organ. Other transcriptions for bells include Josef Strauss's Firefest Polka, Hakuna Matata (from The Lion King), Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy, The Syncopated Clock by Leroy Anderson, The Fairytale Garden by Ravel, and Jamaican Rumba. Also to be heard on the concert are original compositions, including Solace by Sherman, Crossroads by Payn, Prayer for Healing by Buckwalter, and the challenging organ and handbell work Concertante composed by the Week's founder Dr. Donald E. Allured, in whose memory last year's concert was dedicated. Dr. Joseph D. Daniel will be at the organ again for this concert.

So what about Anthornis? That's the title of an original piece for bells by Michael J. Glasgow. The piece, which will be played on the concert, is a musical representation of the New Zealand 'bellbird,' Anthornis melanura. The bird is named for its gorgeous song, which consists of three distinct sounds the resemble the chiming of distant bells.

Thursday's concert starts at 8:00 p.m. in John M. Hall Auditorium. There is no admission charge, but a freewill offering will be received to benefit the Bay View Music Festival Scholarship Fund. It will last approximately one and one-quarter hours, with no intermission. The concert is not suitable for very young children.
