The By-law amendment on the Development Committee changing its status from an Adjunct Committee to a Standing Committee passed with 562 votes in favor, 90 votes opposed, receiving the necessary 2/3 rds vote to amend the By-law.

The Articles of Association amendment to amend the wording to conform to the United Methodist Church's requirements passed with 486 votes in favor, and 156 opposed, receiving the necessary 2/3rds vote to amend the Articles.

The By-Law amendment pertaining to delinquent tax payments (By-Law Section 25, 68 and 69) passed with 570 votes in favor and 89 votes opposed.

With 821 eligible voters, 350 members voted electronicly. That is 42.6% of eligible voters. There were 139 absentee votes.

### Woods Walk Series Concludes

Monday's Woods Walk Down Memory Lane started with a bit of a downpour. The walk on Memorial Trail began with light rain and progressed to a steady shower. After that, the skies cleared, the sun came out and the Bay View Woods sparkled. Ferns glistened. Woodpeckers drummed and Eastern Wood Pewee made their silly-sounding calls. A small patch of Indian Pipe flowers were discovered along the trail between the Gateway entrance and Deer Trail. This was a pleasant surprise since the white flower are more typically seen off Indian Trail.

This walk concluded a series of eight weekly Woods Walks led by Woods Advisory Committee chair Tracy Datlen. The goal of the series was to cover the sprawling trail system one easy walk at a time. Some of the walks were easier than others; each was unique. The 160-acre Bay View Woods encompass a wide variety of terrain, elevations and ecosystems. Some land is high and dry, some is cedar swamp. Participants explored the various trails and learned about the plants, animals and birds that make their home in the woods.

The trails are in excellent conditic due to the efforts and expertise of or long-time ranger Burt Atkinson. Son sections of boardwalk need to be replace to allow proper flow of water in the strea areas. Trail replacement is an ongoin

# Bay View Week of Handbells Concert Approaching

Thursday evening, August 20, at 8 p.m., 104 handbell ringers from across the United States, Canada, and even Paris, France, will again present a concert on the stage of John M. Hall Auditorium.

This concert is a 38-year tradition, eagerly anticipated by audience and performers alike. The music is prepared from Monday noon until Thursday afternoon. With that kind of limited preparation, only advanced ringers are invited to participate.

The Bay View Week of Handbells was instituted by the late handbell expert Dr. Donald E. Allured, who led the annual event for its first 25 years. Since then, the Week of Handbells has been led by former Michigan resident Carl Wiltse, who now resides in Scotland.

The concert will include music written expressly for handbells as well as orchestral transcriptions. Patricia Barnes, of Downers Grove, Illinois, will play two selections for organ and handbells.

Audience members will hear such familiar tunes as St. Louis Blues, Maple Leaf Rag, The Washington Post, and Brazil. Transcribed from the classical piano repertoire will be Rondo alla Turca by Mozart, as arranged by ringer-participant Catherine McMichael of Saginaw, Michigan.

Original handbell compositions will include bells and organ performing Allegro Grandioso which opens the concert. Other original pieces will be Centennary, by William Payn, and Enhebrado de la Aguja Del Espacio (Threading the Space Needle) by Matthew Prins.

Two hymn settings will be performed by the group: Just As I Am and Pax, both by Mr. Wiltse. Fantasy on Southern Folk Hymns, by Margaret Tucker, for organ and handbells will again feature Ms. Barnes at the organ joining the ringers.

Assistant Director Fred Graman of Paris (France), will conduct his ov piece Veni Veni, Emmanuel, subtitl O Come, O Come, Emmanuel as well founder Allured's Canticle of Peace.

This concert will be the last of Operations Manager Luanne Barn of Grand Rapids, who has held the post for 12 years. Her responsibility have included oversight of all to multitudinous details involved organizing an event such as the We of Handbells. She will be sorely misse
